
# Theme Selection and Exploration

**Aim**: To prepare you for A Level Art, tasking you to think carefully about a theme for your new project and explore your initial reactions to it.

Your first project can be based around <u>one</u> of the following themes: Environments, Objects and Possessions, Natural Forms and The Human Figure- you may wish to choose your own theme, in which case email <u>Jade.Nicholson@Swindon-academy.org</u> to discuss this further.

- 1. Create a **title page** for your project with a brief explanation of the task. Ensure the title is large and add drawings which visualise the chosen theme. Add key words and explanations about what the theme entails.
- 2. Double page exploring your theme this is like doing a mind map, except for all of your ideas merge to create a double page that looks like a piece of artwork in its own right. You should think about; background, layering, drawing and sketching, collage and annotation to build up your response please see example on the following page.
- 3. Initital artist research find an artist that has good social, contextual and historical context. Remember you cannot write any information about an artist that has no history or writing attached to them. I would suggest finding an artist from an accredited source such as the tate website. Gather at least 5 images, information about them and some history about the art movement they are involved in.
- Why have you chosen the theme try to explain your reasons and interests?
- What are your ideas for the initial development of your project?
- Why have you selected the images you have?
- Have you arranged them in a particular way?
- How can this artist help you to develop your theme further?

## Task 2:

# Artist inspiration page


**Aim**: To prepare you for A Level Art, tasking you to think carefully about a theme for your new project and explore your initial reactions to it.

- 1. Gather a single image by 10 artists who have explored a similar theme to the one you have chosen.
- 2. Neatly cut up the images by the different artists and arrange them in order of preference.
- 3. Write a brief description of what the artist does and what you can see in the image do not forget to add their full name.

4. Present your images creatively with your notes on a page/s in your sketchbook with a neat and creative title 'Artist Inspiration Page/s'.

### Aim high:

- Add a border and decoration to the page
- Draw one of the images by the artists
- Find additional images by the artists
- Find additional artists



## Task 3:

# Artist Research and response

**Aim**: To prepare you for A Level Art, tasking you to think carefully about other artists, designers or craftspeople who have approached similar themes to the one you have chosen.

#### Artist Research:

- A) Select one artist that inspires you. Produce a research page on this artist. Present your research onto one page, with examples of their work as well as analysis on them and your favourite piece of their work. Ensure you use visual strong examples of their work. Try to avoid 'small' Google images, as they can become pixelated, which looks awful!
- B) Respond to each artist by producing a study of their work in varied materials (pen, pencil etc.). Try to be as accurate as you can.



## Response:

- C) Respond by taking your own photographs Produce at least six images, either individual or a set, which explores your theme. These should be in some way inspired by the work of the artist you have researched. Present your work. Analyse your own work, discussing its success and interpretation of the theme. Use clear and concise language with terminology when appropriate.
- D) Complete a detailed pencil study of one of your photographs
