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Understand the pathways to your future


You will make three decisions during your education:

No 1 – Year 9 GCSE Options


No 2 – Year 11 Post 16-Option

No 3 – Year 13 Post 18 destination

The below chart shows your options for your 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} decision



The colours indicate which option at 16+ will allow you to progress to options at 18+. For example, if you complete an apprenticeship at KS5, you cannot then go to University. The only way to do a degree would be to go onto complete a Degree Apprenticeship.








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- The progression pathways are very flexible and allow learners to choose exactly what suits them and future employability
- All young people have to be in education or training until they are 18. This can be
 full- time education at a school, college or training provider, apprenticeship or
 traineeship, or employment or volunteering (20+ hours per week) but must be with
 education or training leading to a nationally recognised qualification
- The Government is committed to ensuring all young people achieve GCSE grade 4 or higher in English and Maths so if you do not achieve these grades at school, you must continue to work towards them until you are 19 no matter what you are doing
- Most employers, including those offering apprenticeships usually only recruit students that have achieved 5 grade 4+ GCSEs incl. English and Maths

Understand the **Levels of education** in the UK






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Questions to ask yourself

- What are your most favoured subjects and least favoured subjects and why?
- How do you like to learn? In a classroom setting where a teacher is talking to you (auditory), watching things on youtube (visual) or by taking part in things (kinaesthetic)?
- What is your preferred method of study exams vs controlled assessments vs portfolios of evidence?
- What qualification level do you currently aspire to level 1 to 8? (look at the levels roadmap above)
- What post-16 (after Year 11) progression pathway are you thinking about now? (Sixth Form, College or Apprenticeships)
- What post-18 (after Year 13) progression pathway are you thinking about now?
 (University, Degree Apprenticeship or Employment)
